- also asked him whether or not he began referring to
- the Straight, the Straight people, as victims of a
- 3 Holocaust as generated by some antisemetic agenda
- suggesting perhaps that because they were on the board
- of the Holocaust musem that this is some sort of
- 6 hidden agenda Mr. Bradbury has.
- And that this is somebody entirely different
- using the same extreme kind of readeric.
- 9 MR. ENGLANDER: Two things. Mr. Bradbury is the
- one who interjected that; number 2, you might as well
- line up 75 thousand people who can sit back and say
- this organization does this, that organization does
- 13 that. That's irrelevant to this case. You haven't
- 14 pled that as a defense.
- You know, Mr. McGowan, I really don't want to
- waste an awful lot of time. If you've got a couple
- questions you want to wrap up, that's fine with me.
- But if not, I would object and say let's take it down
- 19 to the judge.
- MR. MCGOWAN: I have a few questions on this,
- and then we'll move on.
- MR. ENGLANDER: Okay.
- 23 BY MR. MCGOWAN:
- Q. I would assume you find that very offensive?
- MR. ENGLANDER: "That" being antisemitism?

- MR. MCGOWAN: No, the participants of Straight
- with Hitler youth.
- BY MR. MCGOWAN:
- 4 O. I would assume that's an offensive comment?
- 5 A. Extremely.
- 6 Q. Okay. Do you -- are you aware of internet
- message boards and web sites that have to do with
- B people who consider themselves victims of Straight?
- 9 A. Yes, I am aware of them.
- 10 Q. Do you ever visit those web sites?
- 11 A. I do not.
- 12 Q. Why is it that you don't?
- 13 A. Because they're false.
- Q. Okay. And would it also be because they're
- 15 offensive?
- 16 A. They are offensive, yes.
- 17 Q. Okay.
- 18 A. And threatening.
- Q. Okay. And I would assume that it's fair to say
- that you've got better things to do than read people
- saying nasty things about you or the work you've done?
- 22 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Going back to the initial complaint,
- which is Exhibit 2, we were talking about Mr. Bradbury
- 25 being arrested in 1988 charged with burglary.

- Do you know how that case turned out, the
- burglary case?
- A. You mean whether or not he was adjudicated?
- Q. Yes, ma'am.
- A. I think so, yes. I think he was adjudicated.
- Q. Okay. Do you know whether or not the injunction
- that came out of that case was lifted; that the
- 8 injunction was dissolved in the 1988 case?
- 9 A. I think so. I think it had a time limit on it.
- 10 Q. Yeah. And time expired?
- 11 A. I believe so.
- Q. Did you take any action -- strike that. Were
- you aware at the time that this injunction either was
- 14 about to or had expired?
- 15 A. No.
- 16 Q. All right. Did there come a time when you
- became aware that the injunction had expired?
- 18 A. Probably.
- 19 Q. Okay. Did you do anything to try to get it
- 20 reinstated?
- A. Yes, I have.
- Q. Okay. Starting with the first action you took
- to get it reinstated, tell me everything you've done
- 24 to get it reinstated?
- A. I have hired counsel in order to get -- not that

- particular one reinstated but a separate one, I
- 2 assume.
- Q. Okay. Are you talking about Mr. Englander?
- 4 A. I am.
- Q. Okay. Mr. Englander, I think you hired a couple
- 9 years ago, and we'll get to that.
- But back in '88, '89, in that time frame, did
- 8 you hire counsel to do anything?
- 9 A. '80 what?
- 10 Q. '88, '89, that time frame to get that injunction
- 11 reinstated.
- 12 A. I don't recall doing that, no.
- Q. Paragraph 8 says that Bradbury's fixation with
- the Semblers never ceased. What evidence do you have
- that Richard Bradbury has a fixation with you and your
- 16 family?
- A. By his own words.
- 18 Q. His own words?
- 19 A. Yes, his testimony.
- 20 O. And what words would that be?
- 21 A. That he's been stalking around my house,
- invading my privacy, trying to embarrass us, trying to
- extort money from us.
- Q. When you say "in his words," I'm assuming you
- 25 read his deposition?

- A. I have.
- Q. He never says, I invated their privacy. That's
- your conclusion. He admits to having done certain
- 4 things. It's your conclusion?
- 5 A. He invated my privacy.
- 6 Q. Let's talk about that. How did he invade your
- privacy?
- 8 A. By stalking around my house.
- Q. Okay.
- A. For ten years, by his own admission.
- 11 Q. During that time, do you have any knowledge,
- 12 that he trespassed on your property?
- 13 A. He had to.
- 14 Q. How?
- A. If he went into my garbage, he had to.
- 16 Q. How is that?
- A. Because it's on my property.
- Q. Is it on your property, or is it on a swell that
- belongs to the city?
- A. It's on my property.
- Q. Have you done a survey to determine --
- A. No, I have not.
- Q. Okay. Then how do you know it's on your
- 24 property?
- A. Because I know my property.

- Q. Okay. And is part of your property in the front
- that's dedicated to the city?
- 3 A. Part of it is, yes.
- Q. And is that where you put your garbage?
- 5 A. No.
- Q. Who puts your garbage out?
- 7 A. My maid.
- 8 Q. Okay. Which brings up another question. When
- you've been posted overseas, do you keep the house
- 10 open?
- 11 A. Yes.
- 12 Q. And do you have somebody come in and do
- 13 cleaning?
- 14 A. And do what?
- Q. Do cleaning, routine housekeeping; that type of
- 16 thing?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 0. And while you're away, then do you know whether
- or not garbage is generated, things get thrown out?
- 20 A. I assume so.
- Q. Okay. And the maid would take care of that?
- 22 A. That's correct.
- Q. All right. So your being away does not stop the
- 24 garbage collection?
- 25 A. No.

- Q. All right. What happens to garbage -- what
- happens to your garbage once you put it out there?
- What's supposed to happen to it?
- A. It is supposed to be collected by the City of
- 5 Treasure Island.
- Q. And how do you -- do you use like a plastic bag
- of some kind to put the garbage in?
- 8 A. Yes, we do.
- 9 Q. All right. And have you done that for say the
- past 10 years, 15 years?
- A. Yes, we have.
- Q. Okay. And then the city picks it up. And what
- do they do with it? Do you know?
- 14 A. No.
- Q. Do you know that they put it in some kind of a
- 16 land fill or a dump some place?
- 17 A. I do not.
- Q. Okay. So you don't know where the garbage goes
- once you throw it away?
- 20 A. No.
- Q. Okay. You agree that it goes some place?
- 22 A. Yes.
- Q. Do you know whether it goes to a place that is a
- 24 public place or private place?
- A. I do not know.

- Q. Would you be surprised to know it went to a
- 2 place where anybody can go through it?
- A. No. I wouldn't be surprised.
- Q. Okay. You -- in doing some research on this
- 5 case and listening to you today, you seem to be
- extremely active in antidrug abuse organizations and
- movements. Is that fair to say?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 O. All right. Have you ever heard the term "war on
- 10 drugs"?
- A. Yes, I have.
- Q. What does that mean to you?
- 13 A. The attempt to prevent the use of drugs by
- 14 anybody, illegal mind altering substances.
- Q. And that includes -- or in your mind, does that
- include or has it included over the years tougher law
- 17 enforcement?
- 18 A. No.
- Q. Okay. How about tougher prison sentences for
- 20 offenders?
- A. No. I've never been involved in that.
- Q. Are you aware that that's part of the war on
- 23 drugs?
- A. Yes, I am.
- Q. All right. Are you aware that as part of,

- quote, the war on drugs, there has been a big push to
- search the garbage of people who are suspected users
- or dealers?
- A. Oh, no, I'm not aware of that.
- Q. Are you aware that prosecutors have taken the
- 6 position that there's no privacy interest in garbage?
- 7 A. I was never aware of that, no.
- Q. Okay.
- MR. MCGOWAN: I now have the amended complaint.
- We don't have a 4. So we'll call this 4. This is the
- amended complaint as your counsel pointed out. And
- the wording of it is similar. But why don't you go
- ahead and have a look at this, and we'll resume going
- 14 through it.
- THE DEPONENT: (Deponent peruses the file.).
- 16 (THEREUPON, Exhibit No. 4 is marked for
- 17 identification.)
- 18 BY MR. MCGOWAN:
- 19 Q. You've had a chance to look at that?
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. Have you seen this before?
- A. Yes, I have.
- Q. Now, this particular version is I believe
- unsworn. It's just signed by Mr. Englander. Is that
- 25 accurate? Do you recognize Mr. Englander's signature?

- A. Yes.
- Q. Let's go back to the verified complaint. Okay.
- In paragraph 9 it says, "Recently he bragged to
- 4 media reporters that he has regularly trespassed
- around the Sembler's home on Treasure Island and
- 6 regularly picks through their garbage."
- What reporters did he brag to?
- A. To my knowledge, it was Robin Guess.
- 9 Q. That's one. This is plural, so would the S be
- inaccurate on that?
- 11 A. I'm not sure. I don't know.
- Q. Do you know of any other reporters that he spoke
- 13 with?
- A. I believe there was reporters from the St. Pete
- Times. But I'm not sure about that.
- Q. But you're not sure. Did you ever see any story
- quoting him in the St. Pete Times regarding this?
- 18 A. Which incident?
- Q. Well, the invasion of privacy which you've
- 20 characterized as his invasion of privacy, his going
- 21 through your trash?
- A. That he interviewed with a reporter? Is that
- 23 what you're asking me?
- Q. Well, the paragraph says that he bragged to
- media reporters that he has regularly trespassed

- around the Sembler's home and regularly picked through
- 2 the garbage. That's what is set forth in your sworn
- 3 complaint. So I'm trying to find out which reporters.
- You mentioned Ms. Guess. And you think possibly
- 5 a St. Pete Times reporter?
- 6 A. Yes, uh-huh.
- Q. But you don't know for sure?
- 8 A. That's correct.
- 9 Q. Okay. And how do you know he bragged?
- 10 A. Well, the definition of bragging is the
- 11 repetition of the -- what he did as if it were
- 12 something to be allotted.
- 0. Okay. So if -- so by your definition, if
- somebody does something good or they think is good and
- they tell another person I did a good thing, that's
- 16 bragging?
- A. Would you mind repeating that?
- Q. Yeah. I'm just trying to understand what you
- 19 mean by "brag"?
- A. Exactly what it says in the dictionary; to
- 21 repeat the larger self of something whether it's good
- 22 or bad.
- Q. Okay. All right. Then it goes on to say, "In
- 24 previous years, Bradbury's antics were dismissed as
- 25 coming from an individual who was obsessed but

- harmless, and the Semblers were undaunted by his
- efforts."
- Did you believe in previous years, previous to
- filing this case, that Mr. Bradbury was harmless?
- 5 A. I was unaware of the things he had done. And so
- 6 therefore, I considered him harmless 'till I found
- 7 out.
- Q. So as of 1996, how did you feel threatened by
- 9 somebody who you thought was harmless?
- 10 A. Because he had approached my son and my
- daughter-in-law, because he had come to our offices,
- because he tried to extort money from my husband,
- because he had broken into the Straight building. All
- of these things to me were threatening.
- Q. Okay. But you thought he was harmless?
- 16 A. In the sense that I didn't think he would try to
- 17 attack me.
- 18 Q. Personally?
- 19 A. That is correct.
- Q. Has he ever physically attacked you?
- 21 A. No.
- 22 O. Are you aware of anybody he's ever physically
- 23 attacked?
- 24 A. No, I have not.
- Q. Have you ever heard a story that he physically

- 1 attacked anybody?
- 2 A. No.
- Q. He was asked in a deposition by your attorney
- 4 whether or not he raped his sister. Have you ever
- 5 heard that allegation?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 Q. Then it goes on to say, "In recent months
- 8 however, Bradbury's actions have taken a different
- 9 dimension becoming so dark and fringe as to outrage
- 10 common sensibilities."
- Do you now believe that he is not harmless?
- A. That's a double negative. Would you mind
- 13 repeating that.
- Q. Do you still think he's harmless?
- 15 A. I do not.
- Q. So you think he's harmful?
- A. I certainly do.
- Q. And to the point of committing an act of
- 19 violence?
- 20 A. I do.
- 21 Q. But you're unaware of any act of violence he's
- 22 ever committed?
- A. That is correct.
- Q. And he's never threatened, to your knowledge,
- you or any member of your family with violence, has
